According to our newly adopted meeting schedule for 2018, our next formal "meeting" will be held in conjunction with the National Astronomy Day activities at the W. A. Gayle Planetarium in Montgomery, AL on Saturday, April 21, 2018. The AAS has supported this event for quite a few years now and the event last year had one of the largest public turnouts ever. AAS members are encouraged to bring any type of scope that they may have and plan to arrive at the planetarium well before dark to have adequate time to set up their equipment. This has always been a rain or shine event, so in the case of rain or cloudy weather, we can set up some of our scopes in the planetarium lobby and answer any questions that the visitors may have. There are usually one or more planetarium programs for the public inside prior to coming outside to view through the various telescopes.



As mentioned earlier, our April 2018 "meeting" will be held in conjunction with the National Astronomy Day event planned at the W.A. Gayle Planetarium in Montgomery on Saturday, April 21st. The AAS has supported this event for many years and we hope that all members will turn out to assist the planetarium staff in presenting the wonders of the night sky to the public. This is also the 50th anniversary of the planetarium so they are really hoping for a great turnout. AAS members should plan to arrive late afternoon in order to have time to set up their scopes before dark. The planetarium is located within Oak Park, just off I-85 at Exit 2 and adjacent to Jackson Hospital. Below is a map of the location.



We hope that the weather will be clear on the 21st, but this is typically a rain-or-shine event, meaning that if the skies don't cooperate, we can display some of our scopes inside and answer questions from the public. 


AAS Dues Reminder



Yerkes Observatory Slated to Close

Many in the astronomical community were recently saddened to learn that the historic Yerkes Observatory in Williams Bay, Wisconsin is scheduled to be closed in October of 2018. It was founded in 1897 by astronomy George Ellery Hale and financed by Charles T. Yerkes. It is perhaps best known as the home of the world's largest refracting telescope, featuring a huge 40-in. diameter doublet objective made by the famous optical firm of Alvan Clark & Sons. As you might expect, the telescope itself is massive, featuring a tube over 60-ft. long. The building that houses the telescope is an architectural marvel as well. However, the University of Chicago which operates the facility has deemed it to be too expensive to maintain. Plus, the telescope itself has fallen victim to the advancing technology of ever-larger mirror telescopes. The hope is that it can be retained and used for some sort of public outreach instead of being dismantled. Here are a few photos of the facility.
